MCHS Science Students Continue work with Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant

Thirty-two Marshall County High School students had a chance to see science come to life Sept. 28 at the Paducah Gaseous Diffusion Plant (PGDP). The students, along with their teacher, Tina Marshall, toured the facility as part of a United States Department of Energy (DOE)-sponsored visit. They will be developing an Annual Site Environmental Report (ASER) Summary that documents the site's current environmental condition.

The students met with Jennifer Woodard, the DOE Paducah site lead, as well as several other technical experts from DOE and site contractors. They toured the control room and viewed the production buildings and various testing points/wells of the remediation processes. Following the tour, students learned about the surrounding habitats and wetlands from local experts for upcoming fieldwork to be used in the ASER Summary.



This is the fourth AP high school science class to work on the project. The creation of the ASER allows the students direct access to scientists, engineers, consulting firms and DOE government officials working the PGDP deactivation and decontamination. It gives the students a real-life project that not only contributes to their understanding of their local history, but provides invaluable experience for their academic and professional futures.

Marshall County Tech Center to Receive \$350,000

Stacey Bradley, director of MCTC, received word last week that our Tech Center will receive \$350,000 from the Work Force Investment Grant. This grant is a collaboration with Tech Centers in other school districts (Graves, Calloway, McCracken, and Hickman/Fulton,) and WKCTC. Mr. Bradley completed the grant process back in November. After several re-negotiations with Governor Bevin's office, the committee agreed to accept the \$350,000 that will assist programs at MCTC. The programs receiving the funds will be required to use the grant to improve technology and equipment utilized by their students. They will also receive \$20,000 toward the purchase of a mobile computer lab.

This collaboration is unprecedented and involved multiple district and local governmental agencies. Mary Anne Medlock from the Paducah Area Development District office in Graves County was also instrumental in helping secure the grant. There is currently no announcement regarding when the monies will begin filtering to our Marshall County Technical Center. Our facility which was built in 1973 will benefit greatly from this grant and help our students train with up-to-date equipment to prepare them for future jobs in our community. The state governor's office set the parameters for which programs could be included in the grant based on their projections for jobs within our local communities. Programs receiving funds could include Welding Technology, Construction Technology, Automotive Technology, Health Sciences, and IT.



Marshall County High School to Incorporate 3 Academies for the 2017-2018 School Year

Next school year 3 Academies will be bringing many changes to MCHS.

CAREER ACADEMY

The Career Academy will focus on students taking classes in autobody, welding, carpentry, and welding at the MCHS Tech Center. This academy is for juniors and seniors only. Students will be able to take their Math and English classes in the morning both with a teacher and online, with some flexibility so that students can concentrate on their career area in the afternoon. These afternoons may include shadowing, internships, project-based assessments, co-ops, apprenticeships, etc.

Admission to the Career Academy may be by teacher appointment, interview and parent contract. To attend the academy, students must meet all graduation requirements and pass their Work Keys and obtain either an Industry Certificate or pass their KOSSA test.

Teachers in the Career Academy will be William York, Mike Dotson, Amy Cathey, Shane Darnell, Steve Freeman, Nathan Bazzell, and E'Lesa Adams.

QUEST ACADEMY

The Quest Academy will start with 120-150 9th graders and will add students each year. It will focus on interdisciplinary seminars that show connections across all disciplines. Students will choose areas of focus based on career goals and interests. It will focus on experiential learning, project-based learning, and exploration.

In the junior year, students will begin internships and shadowing related to their career interests. The senior year will be a capstone project that students will have worked on during all years in the academy.

Students will still be allowed to come out of the academy to take electives, AP classes, etc. Teachers in the Quest Academy are Johnny Jones, Evelyn Conley, Erin Mathis, Craig Morris, Kelly Weaver, and Chase Buchanan. LEGACY ACADEMY

The Legacy Academy is what we would think of as a traditional high school—only with several added opportunities for dual credit, online classes, etc. As of this year, Governor Bevin announced that the state of Kentucky is funding 1 college class (3 hours) for juniors and 2 college classes (6 hours) for seniors.

In the Legacy Academy, students may be allowed to leave MCHS campus to take classes at WKCTC or Murray State. For students that do not want to leave campus, we are offering online classes through both WKCTC and MSU.





Our team was on the winning side and received the Judicial Showcase Winner.
